Service Counterindication Guide

This chart is a general guide of common **skin medications**/treatments along with their form, that counterindicate waxing and/or permanent makeup. Medications/treatments targeting other health related issues may also counterindicate waxing. Even in the case of topical application on areas <u>not</u> to be waxed, there is a *possibility* of adverse reaction due to circulation through the blood stream. If skin suitability is a questions please inform your Esthetician **prior** to scheduling.

This chart is not a comprehensive list of counterindicators. There are skin conditions that could exist that counterindicate waxing/permanent makeup such as sunburn/tanned, chaffing, flaking, sore, exfoliated and/or otherwise injured.

It is in Best Practice for Guests to schedule appointments after treatment is completed (or in case of Eyebrow sessions request tweezing <u>instead</u> of waxing). The best amount of time can be 7 days to one year depending on the counterindicator. Ask your Physician for guidance.

Additional Notes:

Advise Esthetician of any discomfort during the service.

Prescription Cream: Medication should be stopped 7 days before waxing and should not be applied for 7 days after waxing.

Antibiotic Pill: Medication may cause sensitivity when waxing. Guest should make their Esthetician aware of any discomfort during service.

Over The Counter Skincare Products: Products are generally safe with waxing, but may include active ingredients that are counterindicative. Products used for exfoliation may cause adverse reactions.

Botox and Chemical Peels: Guests should wait at least 2 weeks after treatments to receive waxing services.

Radiation Therapy: Should consult with doctor before scheduling services.

Other Medications or Treatments: Should Consult with his or her doctor before scheduling services.
